No matter where you find yourself on the political spectrum, no matter the job you have, the family you're part of, where you live, or any other variable one might add to the list, it's almost certain that 2020 has been a year of great challenge for you. Perhaps a year unlike any other.

In some ways, the last few years in America have felt similarly challenging. Students from all of our sites have felt this in a variety of ways. So we decided to start asking more directly how they felt. One of the ways we did this was to ask students to respond to a lesson plan centered around the "Dear America" writing prompt: Write a letter to America expressing what you feel. As mentor texts, students have read, among others, Walt Whitman, Denise Levertov, Natalie Diaz, Bob Dylan, and Langston Hughes. The responses came rapidly, as if the students had been simply looking for an outlet to express themselves regarding the topic. We've gathered some of these pieces for publication in our new chapbook, Dear America. Evidenced in the selected writings are the various emotions many of us might be feeling ourselves, emotions ranging from gratitude to anger, from sorrow to joy, from calls for change to the naming of the good that exists. Our student writers have many thoughts to share and a willingness to be vulnerable and honest in doing so. They have courage, too, and an insistence on being heard through the written word. As Claudia Castro Luna (Washington State Poet Laureate) points out in her Foreword:

... the process of writing is a powerful way to assert the beating of one's heart . . . They write of alienation, not out of resignation. Quite the contrary, through their writing these young women and men move beyond their circumstances to provide plenty of inspiration to fuel constructive social action in those of us lucky enough to read their words"

Some of the pieces in *Dear America* are difficult to read. They may, as good writing often does, surface conflicting feelings within the course of an individual piece of writing. They may surface conflicting feelings within oneself. What they surely suggest is that the heightened emotions present in the national conversation exist here also—within our students, within us. We publish the collection in hopes that our students' honesty and vulnerability can open doorways to the heart, movement towards understanding, reaching across the aisle, and a general

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awareness that the common good must be sought not through entrenched opposition, but in extending to others goodwill and an openness to dialogue.


