re/vision, beauty, and growth

Greetings, Friends.

The old phrase has it that the real work of writing happens through the process of revision, and that this real work has a multitude of iterations. It's a bit the same in the life of organizations as well.

Our first draft, as it were, occurred in the first four years of our existence as a program. In early 2020, a few months after becoming a 501c3 arts nonprofit, the Covid-19 pandemic hit. Like most arts organizations, we've spent the last 2-3 years pivoting, experiencing Covid-era losses, applying for grants, assessing how we might strengthen our programming and collaborative work, and constantly planning for a future that has seemed more uncertain than ever. Yet amidst these times of uncertainty, it is through such adjustments that beauty surprisingly bursts forth and our work continues to grow.


One of the more externally visible growth points we've experienced this year is the expansion of **re/vision**, our one-on-one, year-long creative writing mentorships offered to people experiencing incarceration.



In late January this year, Pen America and Haymarket Books published *The Sentences That Create Us*. Edited by Caits Meissner, one of our Advisory Board members, the book is a beautifully deep and exploratory anthology of essays and writing practices devoted to "crafting a writer's life in prison." At the back of the book, in the Resources section, our **re/vision** program was honored to receive a mention. The week after it was published we also received word that Carnegie Mellon had provided a special grant to get 70,000 free copies of the book to sites of incarceration throughout America.

By March the letters to **re/vision** began to arrive. Multiple letters, daily. All of the letters expressed interest and hope, like the note crafted on an old school typewriter from K.A., an inquirer from Texas, who begins, "I write for more reasons to breathe. I write because I don't catch feelings—I usually give them away . . . I want to be an author so bad my toes hurt."

As the desire from around the country for **re/vision** mentorships was made increasingly evident in our mailbox, our desire to serve the need began to increase as well. And while we continue to prioritize our own local students, we began to expand the mentorships to a wider group of people as well. Such mentoring relationships, in fact, open the door to real transformation. To quote our mentoring manual: "We recognize this exchange as a connective experience where reciprocal learning occurs. As much as we rely on our Mentor's expertise to help deepen the self-expression and literary skills of our Mentees, we also believe in the positive, often transformative, impact of the Mentee's work, ideas, and correspondence on the Mentor."

And we're excited to let you know that after months of scaling up, developing communication flows and a mentoring manual, and onboarding a great group of mentors, we've launched our first full cohort of **re/vision** mentorships as of this month. Our mentees include our own local students, as well as writers experiencing incarceration in Virginia, New Mexico, Kentucky, California, Michigan, Texas, and Ohio.

In addition to selecting our first full group of mentees, we've also developed a packet of information for the nearly 150 inquirers (so far) for whom we cannot provide mentorships at this time. The packet includes two pages of other writing/publication opportunities—including *One Page*, a new publishing opportunity we're offering exclusively for **re/vision** inquirers.


